We have provided this information now so families can plan ahead and make thoughtful purchases over Christmas and the Back-to-School period. This supports students to arrive in 2026 with what they need to succeed, and gives families time to prepare without pressure.

To help everyone access accurate information, please remember that **all College updates for parents are available through the Parent Portal via the BCE Connect App**, as well as on our College website. Our social media pages are not used for official communication and are not monitored. During the holiday period, teachers do not monitor or reply to emails. This is part of our commitment to staff wellbeing.

Please note that the **College Office will be closed from 12 December and will reopen on 12 January**. Any enquiries during this time can be emailed to the office and will be addressed when staff return.

Strong, respectful communication between families and the College is central to student success and wellbeing. As we move into 2026, regular contact with your child's Classroom and Pastoral Care Teachers will remain the best way to support their learning and day-to-day needs. To make the beginning of the year manageable for families and staff, we use a staggered approach to ensure communication is timely, purposeful and not overwhelming:

- Pastoral Care Teachers will make contact with families during Week 1.
- Classroom Teachers will begin contact in:
 - Week 2 for Years 7 to 9 and
 - Week 3 for Years 10 to 12.

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Participation in the Religious Life of the College

As a Catholic Marist school, the religious life of Trinity College is central to who we are. Our Retreats, Rites of Passage, Reflection Days and Camps are not simply events on a calendar – they are formative experiences designed to help young people grow in resilience, identity, faith and connection. These opportunities create space for students to reflect, build relationships, step outside their comfort zone and develop the confidence needed to navigate adolescence with purpose and courage.

As outlined in our Enrolment Policy, participation in the religious and spiritual life of the College is a requirement for all students, whether they are new or continuing. These experiences are an essential part of belonging to Trinity College and are integral to the holistic development we aim to foster.

Families play a vital role in supporting this. Encouraging your teenager to attend, especially when they may feel

apprehensive, strengthens their capacity to manage uncertainty and anxiety. These are skills that are critical for wellbeing and future success. Many students tell us afterwards that these experiences were highlights of their year and moments of genuine personal growth.

Students who do not participate in these compulsory aspects of College life will not be eligible for invitations to non-curricular events, including but not limited to the formal and semi-formal, dance teams, sporting teams, and other opportunities to represent the College. Non-engagement of students in this aspect of College life, may result in a meeting with families regarding ongoing enrolment requirements.

We thank all parents and carers for reinforcing the importance of these experiences and for helping us nurture young people who are grounded, compassionate and ready to contribute to our community and beyond.

Key Dates

To help everyone stay informed and organised, the College maintains three different calendars, each designed for a specific purpose.

Public Website Calendar

The Public Website Calendar highlights major College events that involve our wider community. This includes whole-school celebrations, key dates across the year and events that are open to or involve parents, carers and visitors.

Parent Portal Calendar

The Parent Portal Calendar includes the day-to-day information families need, such as year level events, meeting times, excursion details, reminders and notices that support planning at home. This requires a log in to view. New families receive access 30 days from their start date. This calendar also includes invitations, event information, start and finish times.

Student Portal Calendar

The Student Portal Calendar is designed specifically for students and includes sports trials, training sessions, co-curricular commitments, assessment checkpoints and other student-focused activities. This requires a log in to view. New students receive access from their start date.

COURSE CHANGES

As part of our personalised learning approach, course (subject) **changes can only be requested during Weeks 2, 3 and 4 of each semester**. This window allows teachers to establish classes effectively and ensures students do not miss essential learning.

Families are reminded that **class changes cannot be made for social reasons**. This includes requests to be with friends or to move to another or preferred teacher or changes due to teaching or learning style. To maintain balanced classes and high-quality learning environments, the College reserves the right to decline changes that fall into these categories.

Thank you for your support in reinforcing this with your child. Our aim is to provide consistent, well-structured learning pathways where every student can continue to grow, belong and thrive.

My Learning PATH Begins in 2026

In 2026, Trinity College will begin My Learning PATH with all students in Years 7 to 10. This is a significant step forward for our community and brings personalised pathways into the junior years in a way that supports every learner. We have spent almost three years preparing for this change, and throughout 2025 our students have been introduced to the routines and expectations that will help them feel ready and confident.



Like any new initiative, we expect there may be some early teething issues as everyone settles in. However, both our staff and students are well prepared, and we are entering this new phase from a very strong position. My Learning PATH is designed to help students gradually take more responsibility for their learning as they grow. The long-term aim is to support young people to become independent, life-long learners who continue to develop their skills well beyond their school years. This approach provides support early on and then encourages students to step forward with increasing confidence and ownership.

To strengthen this work, our **Explicit Improvement Agenda** will continue to guide high-quality teaching across the College. My Learning PATH will sit alongside a renewed focus on **Explicit and Direct Instruction**, which ensures that students receive clear and structured teaching that builds strong foundations. Our teachers will be taking a back-to-basics approach and focusing on the essential knowledge and skills students need before progressing further in their pathway.

We are excited to begin this journey with our community and look forward to seeing students grow, gain confidence and enjoy their learning in 2026.

Trinity Time is Phone-Free Time



At Trinity College, our priority is to maintain a safe, calm and connected learning environment where students can focus, build positive relationships and be fully engaged in school life.

Our “**Trinity Time is Phone-Free Time**” expectation requires all personal devices—including mobile phones and wearable technology—to remain **off and away** from first bell to the end of the school day, including during morning tea and lunch and when representing the College or engaging in College activities after hours. This supports healthy screen habits, encourages students to

talk face-to-face with peers, and reduces distraction and social pressure.

This refined approach follows a **two-year trial** and review of our Personal Device Policy, along with extensive **feedback from families, staff and students**. We thank our community for their honest insights and strong support. They have helped shape a policy that keeps young people safe, supports their wellbeing, and reflects the rapid changes in technology now impacting schools.

AI-Enabled Smart And Wearable Technologies

A significant focus of the review was the growing availability of AI-enabled smart and wearable technology. Devices such as Meta AI glasses, Google Glass, and Apple/Samsung/Android wearables with AI capability pose substantial risks to privacy, safety and the dignity of students and staff.

As outlined in our updated policy, these devices are capable of recording, streaming, storing and analysing personal information in ways that young people cannot reasonably control. They can breach the Privacy Act 1988 (Cth), the Information Privacy Act 2009 (Qld) and create situations inconsistent with our duty of care.

For these reasons, all AI-capable wearables are strictly prohibited on College grounds or at College Events, for students, staff, parents and visitors. This includes any device with embedded audio or visual recording, speech recognition, internet access or AI capability. Possession or use of such devices is not permitted during any school activity or event.

All technology required for learning is provided by the College. Students who need to contact home during the day can do so through Student Reception, ensuring communication occurs in a supported and appropriate manner. We appreciate your continued partnership as we promote student wellbeing, reduce unnecessary distractions, and uphold a learning environment where every young person can thrive.

All AI-capable wearables are strictly prohibited on College grounds or at College Events, for students, staff, parents and visitors.

FAQs – Stationery, Textbooks, Devices and Day One Readiness

What stationery does my child need for 2026?

The College's single stationery list outlines the core items all students require for learning, organisation and classroom activities. Families are encouraged to check the list and ensure items are labelled where possible.

Do they need all stationery items on Day One?

No. Students simply need their core stationery, their laptop and three exercise books. Other items can be brought in during the first week.

Do I need to purchase textbooks?

Most of the College's textbooks are provided digitally through **Box of Books**. Students access these resources online through their school login. Only class novels or literature texts and some mathematics texts will be in hard copy.

How does Box of Books work?

Students log in through the Box of Books website or app to access their digital texts. Teachers will support students in using these resources throughout the year.

Does the College provide laptops and laptop bags?

Yes. Trinity College provides each student with a school-issued laptop and carry bag that meets all learning, software and security requirements.

- Year 7s will receive their laptops at the Welcome and Rite Of passage Ceremony (Wednesday 28 January).
- Year 10s will receive their laptops during Period 1 Thursday 29 January

Can my child bring their own device?

No. Students are not permitted to bring their own laptops, tablets, Chromebooks or any other alternative devices. All students must use the College-issued laptop to ensure consistency, safety, software compatibility and access to digital resources.

What happens if my child's laptop is damaged?

Students must report any damage to their laptop as soon as possible so the device can be assessed and repaired quickly. A \$200 insurance excess applies to all repairs or replacements. As outlined in our Acceptable Use of IT Policy, each student is responsible for the care of the laptop assigned to them, and the insurance excess remains the responsibility of the student and their family.

Can the \$200 insurance fee be added to school fees?

No. The \$200 insurance excess must be paid in full directly and **cannot** be added to or incorporated into school fees.

What does my child need to bring on their first day?

Year 7s will need to bring to following items on their first day:

- Two exercise books
- Pencil case with pens, pencils etc
- School bag and School Hat
- Lunch

We begin normal classes from Period 3 on Thursday 29 January. Students must bring:

- Three exercise books
- Pencil case with pens, pencils etc
- College-issued laptop (fully charged) – excluding Year 10
- School bag and School Hat
- Lunch

Students must be nominated by their school to attend District Trials.

Direct attendance without prior nomination is not permitted.

Nomination Procedure:

1. Notify the College Sports Leader, Ms Bell (jabell@bne.catholic.edu.au), before the nomination deadline listed in the calendar.
2. Provide the following information:
 - ✓ student's name,
 - ✓ date of birth,
 - ✓ club and/or representative experience, and
 - ✓ preferred playing positions.
3. Ms Bell will submit all nominations to the District Convenor by the due date.

Parent Permission Booklet:

All Parents / Caregivers must complete the Parent Permission and Details Booklet online. Booklets must be printed and brought to school for Miss Bell to sign. If booklets are unable to be printed at home, email the completed booklet to Miss Bell.

Students will not be permitted to participate in trials without the signed booklet.

New Students to the College (Yrs 8 to 11) Orientation Session

All new students in **Years 8, 9, 10 and 11** are invited to attend our Orientation Session on **Wednesday, 28 January**, from **8.30am to 10.30am**. Students are asked to wear their **sports uniform** for this session.

New students in Years 8, 9 and 11 will receive their College laptop during the morning and will be supported to log in and set up their device. Year 10 students will receive their device on the first day of school.

The session is led by our Student Growth and Wellbeing Team, supported by our Year 12 Senior Leaders. Students will take part in a guided tour, meet key staff and learn about daily routines and expectations.

Orientation is an important time for teenagers to get to know their new environment in a smaller, low-pressure setting. Becoming familiar with the spaces, staff and routines ahead of time helps reduce first-day nerves and allows students to start their journey feeling more comfortable and confident.

Fee Concessions (BCE Policy)

The College is committed to supporting families experiencing genuine financial hardship. In line with Brisbane Catholic Education policy, families may apply for a fee concession if they are facing circumstances that significantly impact their ability to meet tuition and school fee obligations. Concessions apply to school fees and tuition only. They do not apply to extra-curricular activities, representative sport, camps, additional certificates or diplomas, or any program with optional or external costs.

Mary MacKillop Education Fund Bursary

Families experiencing short-term or unexpected financial difficulty may also be eligible for support through the Mary MacKillop Education Fund Bursary. This Brisbane Catholic Education initiative provides temporary assistance to help families manage essential school-related costs during periods of hardship. The Fund is designed to ensure students can remain fully engaged in their learning while their family works through challenging circumstances. Eligibility for Extra-Curricular and Representative Activities

To participate in extracurricular activities that attract additional costs, including representative sporting teams, tours, interstate and overseas travel or other off-campus events, a family's school fee account must be in good standing. These activities sit outside the core learning program at the College and are not essential to curriculum requirements.

Uniform Expectations for 2026

Our uniform expectations are grounded in Workplace Health and Safety requirements and workplace preparation, which guide all decision-making at Trinity College. **WHS is our primary motivator, and expectations are not adjusted based on student or family preference.** These standards help ensure that students are safe, prepared for learning and developing the habits they will need as young adults entering work environments.

Many of our uniform requirements are directly related to safety. *Some examples* include:

- ✓ **Hair that touches the shoulders must be tied back** to prevent safety risks around equipment, in science and technology spaces and during physical activity.
- ✓ **Facial hair must be kept clean-shaven**, as stubble or beards can affect the proper seal of resuscitation masks used in First Aid.
- ✓ **Fake eyelashes must be natural in appearance**, as they can obstruct vision or become lodged into the eye during physical activity, practical lessons or emergency situations, increasing the risk of slips, trips or delayed response times.
- ✓ **Long cosmetic nails are to be avoided** can cause injuries and interfere with safety procedures when students use sports equipment, musical instruments, tools, science apparatus or kitchen equipment. They also affect the safe use of PPE in various areas of the College, which may tear or fail to fit correctly, creating hygiene and contamination risks.
- ✓ **Heavy makeup is not permissible** as it can contaminate equipment used in practical subjects such as science, hospitality or HPE, and can cause hygiene concerns when students use shared resources.
- ✓ **Correct footwear protects students from injury**, and
- ✓ **Jewellery restrictions** support safe participation in practical subjects.

These expectations are practical and aligned with WHS requirements in both school and workplace settings.

Families may hear from teenagers that certain uniform expectations do not apply, such as using non-school backpacks, wearing non-school jumpers, omitting ties or belts, choosing incorrect shoes or socks or attending school without a hat. **This is not accurate.** These requirements are clearly outlined in our Uniform Policy and Enrolment Policy, and all students are expected to meet them daily.

We acknowledge that some students may have cultural considerations that influence personal presentation. These circumstances must be discussed with College Leadership in advance and must be clearly linked to the student's cultural or faith practice. At times, adjustments to some activities or curriculum experiences may be required while cultural considerations are reviewed. Our approach always remains respectful, while keeping safety and learning at the centre of our decisions.

From 2026, and consistent with our back to basics approach, **non-compliance** with uniform expectations will result in **escalating behaviour sanctions** in line with our **Student Behaviour Support Policy**. Students will be supported to meet expectations; however, ongoing non-compliance will be addressed through the established behaviour processes of the College.

Wearing the correct uniform is more than following rules. It forms part of a **Holistic Catholic Education**, helping students develop pride, belonging and readiness to learn. It supports their formation as young people who understand how to present themselves appropriately in a range of settings, which is an important skill for future employment. As the saying often attributed to Coco Chanel reminds us, "Dress impeccably and they remember the person." A consistent and professional appearance helps students feel confident and ready to participate fully in College life.

Our uniform is an important expression of who we are as a Catholic school community. Thank you for supporting these expectations and helping your teen arrive each day prepared, safe and ready to learn.

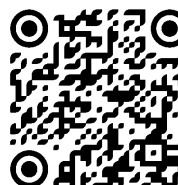
Middle School Dance Troupe

Entry is by audition. The troupe offers a focused, energetic program for students who enjoy dance and want to extend their skills through performance and teamwork.



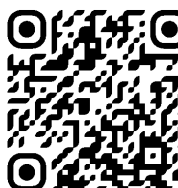
Instrumental Music Program

Medication Administration Procedures

As we enter the 2026 school year, families are reminded of Brisbane Catholic Education's requirements for the administration of medication at school. These procedures have now been in place for some time and continue to ensure the health, safety and wellbeing of all students while they are in our care.

Where possible, medication should be taken at home. Some medications require food, rest periods or specific timing that schools cannot always guarantee. Administering medication at home helps minimise interruptions to learning and ensures your child can take it under the safest and most consistent conditions. Please review the key points below to support smooth and compliant medication management throughout the year.

Key Requirements

1. Approval by a Registered Health Practitioner

All medications administered at school must be approved by a registered health practitioner. This includes over-the-counter items such as paracetamol and ibuprofen, as well as prescription medications and controlled drugs. Families must complete both Form A and Form B in full.

2. Individual Support Health Plans

If your child has a medical condition requiring additional support, an Individual Support Health Plan must be completed. This ensures the school can respond appropriately to your child's needs. Relevant action plans (such as asthma or anaphylaxis plans) must also be provided.

3. Types of Medications

These procedures apply to all categories of medication, including:

- Over-the-counter medicines
- Pharmacy-only medicines
- Pharmacist-only medicines
- Prescription medicines
- Controlled drugs

4. Medication Packaging

Schools cannot cut or alter medication. If tablets must be divided, they must be pre-cut by a pharmacist, such as in a Webster pack. All medication must be supplied in the most recently dispensed packaging.

5. Emergency Medications

Emergency medications such as inhalers and EpiPens must be accompanied by up-to-date instructions and action plans from the health practitioner.

6. Dosage Changes

If your child begins a new medication or has dosage changes, the school requires clear written instructions from the health practitioner. The pharmacy label should reflect the current dosage.

7. Administration Timing

Medication will only be administered within the approved time window, usually a 30-minute period. The school cannot administer medication outside these instructions. Parents or guardians may attend the school to administer medication if needed.

8. Delivery of Medication

Medication must be delivered to the school by a parent or legal guardian. Please contact the College if special circumstances apply.

9. Missed Doses

The school cannot administer additional doses beyond the approved instructions. Parents or guardians may attend the school to administer a missed dose if required.



For medication to be administered at school, parents or legal guardians must provide:

- ✓ Completed Form A (Request to Administer Medication)
- ✓ Completed Form B (Medication Administration Instructions)
- ✓ Medication in its original pharmacy or Webster packaging with a current label
- ✓ Any written instructions from the health practitioner
- ✓ Relevant action plans where required
